- Accessible sandy beaches and rock pools to explore.
- Vibrant seasonal events and cultural festivals will entertain you.

We are just two minutes off the main A1 and less than an hour by car to Edinburgh, Scotland's capital city. If arriving by train, Berwick-upon-Tweed railway station is only 9 miles from Eyemouth. The area is well serviced by local bus companies.

### Out & About:

- Golfing – Eyemouth has an 18 hole championship course. Experience the 6th hole which was voted Britain's most extraordinary!
- Surfing at Coldingham Bay – so good the conditions are reported daily on satellite television!
- Diving – wide range of sites in a spectacular underwater environment, ranging from shallow scenic dives to technical wreck diving.
- Kayaking – explore the bays and headlands of our rugged coastline. Kayak hire available.
- Walking – cliff, country and beach walks - the Berwickshire Coastal Path is a must and can easily be broken down into smaller sections.
- Cycling – explore the surrounding villages and countryside at your leisure.
- Bird and wildlife watching – feed the seals at the feeding station in Eyemouth harbour.

### Indoor Attractions:

- Gunsgreen House – built by John Adam in the 18th century for a local smuggler. Now offering a family day out full of smugglers and secrets.
- Eyemouth Museum – home of the stunning Eyemouth tapestry, commemorating the Great East Coast Fishing Disaster of 1881.
- Eyemouth Maritime Centre – hosting a magnificent display of coastal craft.
- St Abbs Visitor Centre – a natural starting point for visitors to the Berwickshire coastline.
- Leisure centre with 2 swimming pools, sauna and gym.
- Ten pin bowling and amusement arcade.
- Independent shops and galleries.



## ST ABBS

St Abbs lies at the foot of the National Trust for Scotland Nature Reserve and, with its cafes and visitor centre, it's the perfect place to begin a day in the outdoors.



## COLDINGHAM


